Program Description

The primary mission of the Broward College Institute of Public Safety, located on A. Hugh Adams Central Campus, is to prepare the student as a Criminal Justice Practitioner and for such jobs as Police Officer, Corrections (jail/prison) Officer, U.S. Customs or I.N.S. Immigration Inspector, Crime Scene Technician, Community/Police Service Aide or Polygrapher. The Institute of Public Safety is certified by the Florida Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission as a training center which authorizes the basic Law Enforcement and Corrections Academy training as well as in-service, advanced and career development training to meet local needs.

Students seeking to transfer to a university for a baccalaureate degree for a "professional position" such as Probation Officer, Parole Officer, Special Agent for U.S. Federal Agencies (such as FBI or DEA), Juvenile Counselor, or Social Caseworker should take an appropriate Associate in Arts Degree Program. Program sheets are available in the Office of Student Affairs/Counseling Office.

Criminal Justice Technology Associate in Science Core Courses

An A.S. degree in Criminal Justice may be earned by completing the General Education and Criminal Justice Core Requirements and Specialization courses indicated in the option selected. The associate degree does not qualify students for state certification as corrections or law enforcement officers.
