Broward College Celebrates Black History Month



A myriad of events were hosted in celebration of Black History Month across Broward College campuses. Highlights included a Festival of Icons, musical workshops, guest speakers, panel discussions, a film series, and more.

More than 150 students attended the opening of "I and I: The Politics of Self-Love" at the South Campus Art Gallery. The exhibit, part of the Broward College South Campus Office of Cultural Affairs (BSOCA) programming, features the work of student self-portraits and professional artwork from Miami muralist Serge Toussaint. The exhibit is on display through March 16.

In addition to student-focused events, Bailey Hall was home to "Common Humanity...The Colors of History," the 13th annual Black History Month art exhibit. Curated by Jean-Jacques Stephen Alexis, the collection featured more than 70 pieces created by local African-American artists. Paintings, sculptures and ceramics were among the type of media on display. An opening reception kicked off the exhibit's run with tropical music, modern African dancers, spoken word and original modern Afro-Caribbean Art.




BC Celebrates 25 Years of Endowed Teaching Chair Awards

Volunteer Groups from MLK Day of Service Recognized During Awards Ceremony



Broward College recognized the volunteer efforts from the MLK Day of Service during an awards ceremony. The institution partnered with the 2017 MLK Day of Service Advisory Board to support 36 projects honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s legacy. In all, more than 3,100 participated across eight municipalities, logging more than 16,000 hours. Among the volunteers were students, faculty and staff of the College, as well as others in the community.

Projects included support for veter-

ans, neighborhood improvement, health promotion, environmental initiatives, education, economic opportunity, and more. Since 2015, the Broward College MLK Day of Service has funded nearly 100 service projects.

Faculty Exhibition. Broward College was the first community college in the nation to establish an Endowed Teaching Chair program to recognize outstanding teaching and commitment to academic excellence, and has honored more than 180 faculty since its inception. On March 2 and 3, a committee of Foundation donors and community members will review faculty presentations and select the recipients for the 26th year.

Broward College Hosts 2017 Professional Development Day

The tradition continued as faculty and staff at Broward College participated in the 2017 Professional Development Day. The Leading Educational Achievement through Development (LEAD) initiative hosts workshops and lectures on a variety of topics important at the institution including an overview of Pathways 101, how to maximize student learning, and how to engage students in class and online. Each session was geared to enhance knowledge and increase student success. A total of 661 faculty and staff participated in this all-day learning conference.

Benefits and Wellness Fair Hosted on Campuses

Benefits and Wellness Fair events were organized at numerous campuses at Broward College throughout February. Each welcomed staff and faculty to enjoy vendors, check their wellbeing with health screenings, and participate in a series of activities to get people moving. Attendees learned how making small changes in a diet or 30 minutes of daily exercise can have a positive impact.

News from the February Board Meeting

Central Campus Students and Staff Shine at Board Meeting



Prior to the February meeting, the Central Campus Student Government Association (SGA) had the opportunity to address the Board of Trustees and share their suggestions for campus improvements. Led by president Joseph Rolo, SGA members discussed WiFi connection, alternative energy (solar power), spider extermination, printing services, healthier food options and an expanded Student Union. Students from the College Academy then came forward to highlight their successes and brought forth ideas such as a student think tank with faculty, and ways to help support engineering students.

Jose Lopez, campus student life director, then shared stories from the Rally in Tally where students toured Florida State University, the Governor's Mansion, visited the Capitol where they met with elected officials and exchanged ideas.

Quakish Liner, district director of the Honor's College, then brought attention to the Brain Bowl team to highlight their success. The College has been competing at Brain Bowl for more than 30 years, excelling locally and in state competition.

Three Programs Spotlighted

HEALTH SCIENCES

Deborah Papa, dean of nursing programs, and Nora Powell, interim dean for allied health programs, spoke about the highlights of the Health Sciences Pathway. This includes community involvement, partnership with the Memorial Healthcare System, and nearly 100 percent pass rates for many of its health science programs. The NCLEX pass rate, the licensing exam for nursing, was especially impressive at 94 percent compared to the State pass rate of 72 percent and the national pass rate of 85 percent.

PUBLIC SAFETY

Linda Wood, dean of Institute of Public Safety, spoke about the strides the Public Safety Pathway has made in its mission to build a bridge between law enforcement and the community. She discussed how the C.O.P.S. program, in collaboration with

behavioral and social sciences, hosts events to foster discussions among students and how Tip a Cop, where students volunteer as waiters to help raise money for charity, encourage cadets to be involved in the community. She spoke about upcoming certifications in criminal justice which will be 24 credits and a 9-credit homeland security certification.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

Oscar Feliciano, associate director of military and veterans affairs, spoke about his efforts to engage the veterans on campus and the services the College provides for them. He spoke about the career fairs, including the successful Paychecks for Patriots, where veterans have a full hour to interact with eager employers prior to the event opening to the public. He also discussed how the College is planning to incorporate art as a way of therapy in 2018, which Trustee David Maymon supports.

News from the February Board Meeting

Broward College WHC Redevelopment Project

On Tuesday, February 28, the Broward College District Board of Trustees voted to enter into a pre-development agreement with the Stiles Corporation for the redevelopment of the Willis Holcombe Center.

Once completed, the project will provide an exciting new downtown focal point and long-term partner for Broward College and Florida Atlantic University (FAU) at their downtown campuses. The new facility will create spaces that would benefit students attending the downtown center and assist with some local community planning objectives, and the process will be conducted with no disruption to education and minimal change to daily downtown flow.

In February, 2016, the College received three proposals in response to the ITN. A staff committee reviewed each proposal during a thorough vetting process with assistance from professional consultants, including KPMG and Bryant Miller Olive. Following a multi-step and thorough review, the Broward College District Board of Trustees affirmed the continuation of negotiations with Stiles Corporation in December of 2016.
