### **Broward College President Recognizes** Hard Work for U.S. Senate Debate and **Aspen Institute Visit**

In December, President Armstrong recognized some of the key people behind the success of the U.S. Senate Debate and the Aspen Institute visit during a special holiday reception. He awarded certificates of appreciation for the hard work put forth by those who made each endeavor run smoothly.

Countless hours and dozens of faculty and staff went into the Aspen Institute visit in November. The site visit was part of rigorous a review process for the \$1 million prize fund and the title of the Best Community College in America, and included interviews, tours, luncheons and meetings across all three main campuses. The award will be presented in March 2017.

In October, a wide range of departments – from facilities and IT to marketing and the Foundation - helped host the U.S. Florida Senate Debate between candidates Marco Rubio and Patrick Murphy. The historic event required an immense amount of long hours and logistical planning and garnered admiration from the event's partners, Leadership Florida and the Florida Press Association.

At the end of the reception, Florida College System (FCS) Chancellor Madeline Pumariega praised Broward College for its commitment to excellence and challenged attendees to continue the course for student success.

### AHCD and Education Pathway Communities Present at BOT Meeting

Starting this year, leaders from each of the eight pathways at Broward College will rotate in presenting at Board of Trustees meetings. President Armstrong looks to keep the board and fellow members of the institution updated on the progress of the pathways through these presentations, exemplifying the positive impact the model is having on student success and the college community as a whole. The first two introduced to the board were Arts, Humanities, Communication and Design (AHCD) and Education.

Scott Miller and Jamonica Rolle, deans for AHCD, discussed their programs, including the new Associate of Science degree in New Media Communication, and expressed the importance of contextualization and connecting faculty along disciplines. Dean Miller spoke about how keeping students engaged through art exhibits, lecture series, performances and other events is key to enrollment.

Dr. Jeffrey Nasse, dean of Education, talked about the strides made in the Associate of Arts, Early Childhood Education and Teacher Education Program (TEP). He remarked how faculty have been heavily involved in the collaboration process and planning for the pathway, with more than one hundred attending meetings. Dean Nasse proudly reported that the TEP has reached 100 job placements, and boasted that the program can count seven Teacher of the Year recipients from Broward County Public Schools among its graduates.

### WHC and BC Online Highlight Success and Increased Enrollment

David Shulman and Lisa Barnes joined student government members and other faculty members to present the developments and recent growth of the Willis Holcombe Center and BC Online. The campus has made improvements in its student engagement activities including the opening of Gallery 31 to further promote the arts, as well as and fun events like pick-up basketball to promote student wellness. BC Online enrollment is up nine percent compared to last spring. Students from *P'an Ku*, an arts and literary publication at the College, and Model United Nations were also on hand to give the trustees a look at their successes.
