President Armstrong Accepts Junior Achievement Volunteer Award



President Armstrong was in New York City to receive the U.S. President's Volunteer Service Award on March 7 by Junior Achievement USA. The College was honored with a Silver level award for providing at least 10,000 volunteer hours to local Junior Achievement offices during the 2015-2016 school year. The institution was one of 64 organizations recognized during the JA Volunteer Summit.

Broward College Now Licensed to Produce Its First TEDx Event

Broward College recently secured a license from TED Talk to produce its first TEDx event titled, "Evolution." Students, faculty, and community speakers will be invited to present compelling, interdisciplinary talks related to the evolution of ideas within art, culture, technology, science, and society.

The inaugural series is scheduled for Thursday, October 26 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. TEDxBrowardCollege will consist of three sessions at South Campus, highlighting three speakers and close with an audience discussion. The talks are designed to be multifaceted, and serve as a means of uniting students, faculty, and staff from across the College in conversation.

Organizers for TEDxBrowardCollege series of events are Henry Mack, associate dean of Academic Affairs' Betty Eugene-King, associate professor of Speech Communication, and adjunct professors Stephen Muniz and Glen Beair.

Broward College Supporting Participation and Readiness of Kids in STEM (SPARKS)

A \$14,150 grant from the Bosch Community Fund has helped the College boost its STEM (SPARKS) program. It uses informal learning activities to increase interest in STEM training and careers among low-income and minority elementary school students. Thanks to the grant, the institution purchased a geodesic dome for interactive learning of math and science concepts. A geodesic dome is a hemispherical thin-shell structure creating a classroom-like environment outdoors.

The dome was built by students and faculty with assistance from facilities. North Campus saw 60 students from the College in math and science classes participate in activities, including planting seeds and building the dome. Two dozen fifth graders from Broward Estates Elementary enrolled in the Science for Kids program spent time in and around the dome working on hands-on exercises. In April, another two dozen eighth graders will visit from Crystal Lake Middle. Faculty from varying expertises are also invited to speak to the children and lend their knowledge. Since 2013, organizations in the Fort Lauderdale community have received more than \$200,000 in Bosch Community Fund grants.

North Campus Spotlighted at Board of Trustees Meeting



In March, North Campus served as host to the Board of Trustees meeting. In the Omni Auditorium, members of the Student Government Association (SGA) opened with a Student Forum to discuss this year's campus improvements including storm drainage in the parking lot, gym and recreation area upgrades, renovations to Building 47, and continued efforts to attain funding for Building 56 and 57. After surveying students, they found the top three concerns for the coming year were the need for charging stations, outdoor seating spaces and work to the Omni parking lot.

During the March board meeting, students and faculty who participated in the alternative Spring Break program in Bolivia reflected on the personal impact of the service learning project. On their trip they worked with TECHO, a nonprofit that builds houses and mobilizes volunteers in the fight against extreme poverty in Latin America by giving families in need increased living spaces. As part of the trip, they met students from the International University of Santa Cruz, which is affiliated with the College, and visited an orphanage. Dr. Nilo Marin and Kisha King oversaw the curriculum, as students gained credit toward Introduction to Environmental Science and Honors Interdisciplinary Students in General Education courses for their efforts.

"Light is the Path to Success." Points of pride ranged from engagement events such as the STEAM Visiting Art Series to appearances of renowned speakers like Dr. Steve Perry.

Dr. Lulrick Balzora, Social and Behavioral Sciences and Human Services dean, then discussed developments within his pathway. This included the addition of the Human Services Associate of Science, Geographical Information System certificate, as well as the Pathway Peer Academic Leader and Professional Enhancement programs. He also unveiled the first edition of *Quaestiones*, a new professional journal cultivated by professors, students and faculties on social and behavioral science topics.

Inaugural American Dream Summit to be Held in April

The event is scheduled to take place at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, April 21 at the Signature Grand.
