Broward College Named to Aspen Top Ten for the Third Time

The Aspen Institute has named the College as a Top Ten Finalist for the 2019 Aspen Prize, the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance in America's community colleges. This is the third time Broward College has made the Top Ten List, previously nominated in 2013 and 2017. Awarded every two years, the \$1 million Aspen Prize identifies institutions for their outstanding outcomes in four areas: student learning; certificate and degree completion; employment and earnings; and high levels of access and success for minority and low-income students.

Board of Trustees Names Greg Haile as Next President

The Board of Trustees has named Gregory Adam Haile, Esq. to become the seventh president of Broward College. Haile is expected to assume office in July 2018.



The Trustees voted unanimously for the appointment, citing his knowledge of the community, successful work with the College and passion for education as convincing factors. Since 2011, Haile has been at the forefront of Broward College as its general counsel and vice president for Public Policy and Government Affairs.

Record Number of Associate Degrees Awarded for Spring



Spring 2018 commencement marked one of the largest graduating classes in the history of Broward College with 2,916 associate degrees awarded to students who met their

academic requirements. The 88th graduation ceremony was held on Tuesday, May 8, at the BB&T Center in Sunrise. The College conferred more than 5,000 bachelor's and associate degrees, and technical certificates. Graduates ranged in age from 16 to 79 years old, representing almost 100 countries. Participants in the Broward College World Conference, consisting of representatives from current and future international centers and affiliates as well as United States university counterparts, were present. The keynote address was delivered by Mike Jackson, CEO of AutoNation, Inc. Jackson is recognized as one of the most influential and effective leaders in the automotive industry.

Broward College Vice President for Academic Affairs, Dr. Avis Proctor Named an Aspen Institute Presidential Fellow



Dr. Proctor is among a distinguished group of 40 Aspen Presidential Fellows selected from more than 1,000 institutions across the United States who will embark on a 10-month fellowship beginning in July 2018.

The Aspen Presidential Fellowship for Community College Excellence is a leadership program aimed at preparing the next generation of community college presidents to transform institutions to achieve high and equitable levels of student success both in college and in the labor market. Delivered in collaboration with the Stanford Educational Leadership Initiative, the fellows will work with mentors as well as current and former community college presidents who have achieved exceptional outcomes for students throughout their careers.

Broward College Hosts World Conference



From May 8 to 11, the College hosted the BC World Conference 2018 in Fort

Lauderdale, Florida. More than 70 representatives from international partnership centers and affiliates, potential partners and U.S. university counterparts were in attendance. Under the theme “Building Bridges to American Higher Education,” sessions included networking opportunities, presentations on Workforce Education and Economic Development, Institutional Effectiveness, Effective College Teaching, Active Learning Strategies, and Adopting Standards for Improved Online Classes. Presenters included President Armstrong, members of the College’s executive team and administrators from local universities.

His involvement includes a feeding program for the homeless in downtown Fort Lauderdale, as well as the Minority Male Initiative, a program aimed at helping young men of color achieve their academic dream and the Muslim Student Association.

Patricia Davis and Kenneth McCray



Patricia Davis and her son Kenneth McCray have overcome adversity their whole lives. In 1999 when Kenneth was six, his father died from an undetected aneurysm. Six years later Patricia was diagnosed with a rare form of lymphoma. Young Kenneth, barely a teenager, focused on taking care of his mother. He put everything else in his life on hold. It appeared the worst was behind them when Patricia was able to start working again. Then a few years later the office where she was employed closed and within a year, mother and son were homeless. This experience didn't deter them from achieving their goals. On May 8, 51-year-old Patricia earned her A.S. in Criminal Justice and 25-year-old Kenneth graduated with an A.A. in Computer Science. Earning their diplomas together couldn't be more rewarding for the two.

College students in high-quality solo and chamber music, affording them the opportunity to work with guest artists in a master class setting while giving world-class soloists and ensembles the opportunity to perform at Bailey Hall. Dr. Jure Rozman, assistant professor of Music and recipient of the Rotary Club’s Endowed Teaching Chair, serves as artistic director for the series. The increased funding will provide the community access to additional shows during the 2018-19 academic year at two other performing arts venues at the College – the Performing Cultural Arts Theatre on the Judson A. Samuels South Campus in Pembroke Pines and OMNI Auditorium on the North Campus in Coconut Creek.

Mrs. Larson, who died in August 2016, was an avid supporter of Broward College. Her gifts fund scholarships and programs.

Greg Haile Signs Employment Contract

In May, the Board of Trustees officially signed its employment contract with Greg Haile. The agreement includes the terms and conditions of his employment when he assumes the post as the seventh president of Broward College on July 1. In addition to a base salary, the contract provides a modest motor vehicle allowance, salary adjustments tied to performance as in the case of all non-bargaining unit employees, and approval for Haile to use his vacation time to teach at institutions like Harvard as he has for the last several years. The agreement is for a three-year term and requires an annual evaluation.
