JOBS IN CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Sample Pathways

POLICE OFFICER / DEPUTY SHERIFF

Typical starting salary (Broward County): high 40's – low 50's (\$47,000 - \$52,000) w/ excellent opportunities for overtime

Sample Pathway: Associates or higher college degree OR military service w/ some college credits OR related job experience such as 911 dispatcher or community service aide or corrections (jail/prison) officer. NOTE: Minimum age 19, must be US Citizen, must have a good driving record and be of "good moral character." In some parts of FL. (the more rural areas), stress on college degree is less, and H.S. diploma or GED is acceptable.

CORRECTIONS (JAIL/PRISON) OFFICER

Typical starting salary (Broward): high \$30's (around \$38,000) w/ excellent opportunities for overtime.

Sample Pathway: Same as for police officer above, though the stress on a college education or related job experience is not as high.

CORRECTIONAL PROBATION OFFICER (State of Florida)

Typical starting salary: mid \$30's (around \$38,000)

Sample Pathway: Bachelors degree (helpful if degree is in related area, such as criminal justice, social work or psychology) also helpful if there is related job experience.

SOCIAL WORKER / JUVENILE COUNSELOR

See Correctional Probation Officer information above.

FBI /DEA/SECRET SERVICE / BORDER PATROL OR OTHER U.S. SPECIAL AGENT

Typical starting salary: high \$40's/low 50's (around \$48,000-\$53,000), usually with good pay raises first few years and good opportunities for overtime

Sample Pathway: Bachelors or higher degree OR Bachelors degree with law enforcement or military experience OR, for a few agencies, combination of college course work (though no earned degree) and law enforcement or military experience. NOTE: Knowledge of a second language is a definite plus in being hired, also may be required to work in different cities during the first few years.

U.S. CUSTOMS INSPECTOR / U.S. IMMIGRATION INSPECTOR

Typical starting salary: high \$30's (around \$38,000), usually with decent pay raises and, in South Florida, superb opportunities to earn overtime

Sample Pathway: Associates degree or higher OR related job or military experience OR combination of college course work and related job experience

COMMUNITY SERVICE AIDE / POLICE SERVICE AIDE / 911 DISPATCHER

Typical starting salary: mid to high \$20's (around \$28,000)

Sample Pathway: High school or GED, though college course work is preferred; for community service aide / police service aide must have a good driving record, good reading and writing skills. 911 dispatcher should have good typing skills.

CRIME SCENE TECHNICIAN / FINGERPRINT TECHNICIAN

Typical starting salary: low \$30's (around \$33,000).

Sample Pathway: Special training, such as the Broward College Crime Scene degree program or related work experience (ex: community service aide)

A.A. Degree or A.S. Degree – Which Is Better For You?

Congratulations on your decision to enter the exciting field of criminal justice! At Broward College we offer an Associate in Arts degree in Liberal Arts and three Associate in Science Degrees in Criminal Justice. (An Associate degree is a two-year college program. Some students finish the Associate degree in less than two years. Many students, especially those with family or work obligations, attend college part-time and take longer than two years. It doesn't matter how long you take - what matters is that you achieve your goal and get a college education.)

The Associates in Arts (A.A.) degree is good if you plan to continue your college education beyond the A.A. degree. It gives you all the required courses, such as English, humanities, math and science that you need to eventually earn a four-year Bachelor degree. You would also take some "elective" courses which you pick, such as criminal justice classes.

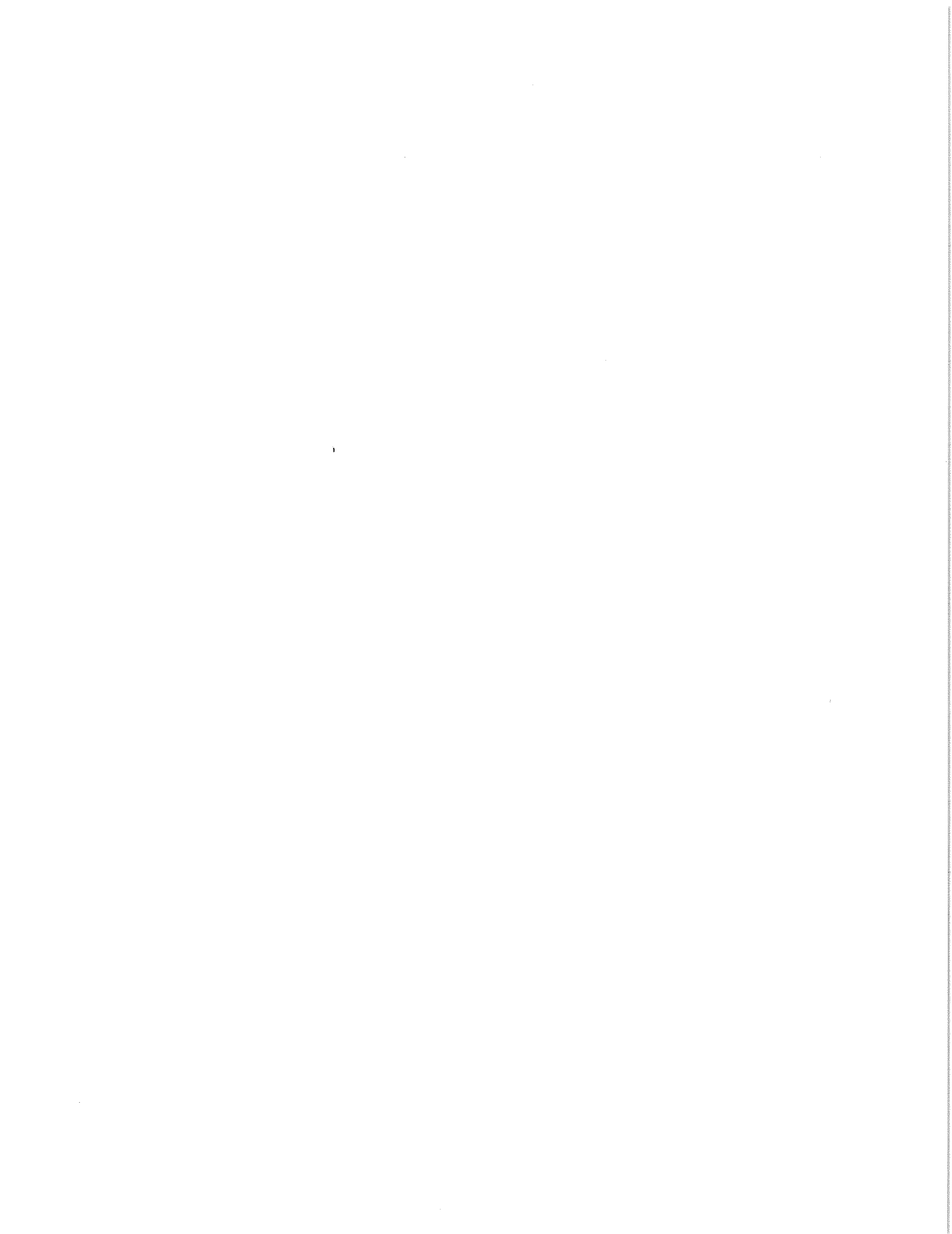
Our other degree programs are Associate in Science (A.S.) degrees. We offer an A.S. Criminal Justice degree in three areas of emphasis: 1) Criminal Justice, 2) Crime Scene, and 3) Polygraph Examination. Unlike the A.A., the A.S. degree has fewer general education courses (math, science, etc.), and instead offers a heavier emphasis in your field of study: criminal justice. In an A.S. degree program, you would take between eight to ten criminal justice courses. With an AS degree you could still transfer to a Bachelor degree program, but you would have to make up missed classes in math, science and other areas.

Types of jobs for which you might qualify with an A.A. or A.S. in Criminal Justice include: police officer, state police/state trooper, deputy sheriff, corrections (jail/prison) officer, US Customs inspector, US Immigration inspector, US Border Patrol officer, polygraph specialist, crime scene technician, community/police service aide and private security positions.

Jobs that require a four year Bachelors degree, for which an A.A. satisfies the first two years, include: probation/parole officer, juvenile counselor, social worker and Special Agent for most of the Federal agencies, such as FBI, DEA, Secret Service or US Customs.

Program Description: The Crime Scene Technician vocational certificate, offered through the BC Institute of Public Safety on the Central Campus in Davie (954-201-6791), is designed for students seeking entry level jobs in law enforcement, including the positions of Crime Scene Technician, Police Service Aide and/or Police Officer or for current law enforcement personnel seeking career advancement by obtaining knowledge and skills in the area of crime scene technology. Students who successfully complete the certificate program may use the credits earned toward the A.S. degree in Criminal Justice-Crime Scene Emphasis.

This certificate program is composed of 10 courses (28 credits total). Two of the ten courses have prerequisite course requirements. Thus, it is strongly recommended that students take the courses in the order listed below.

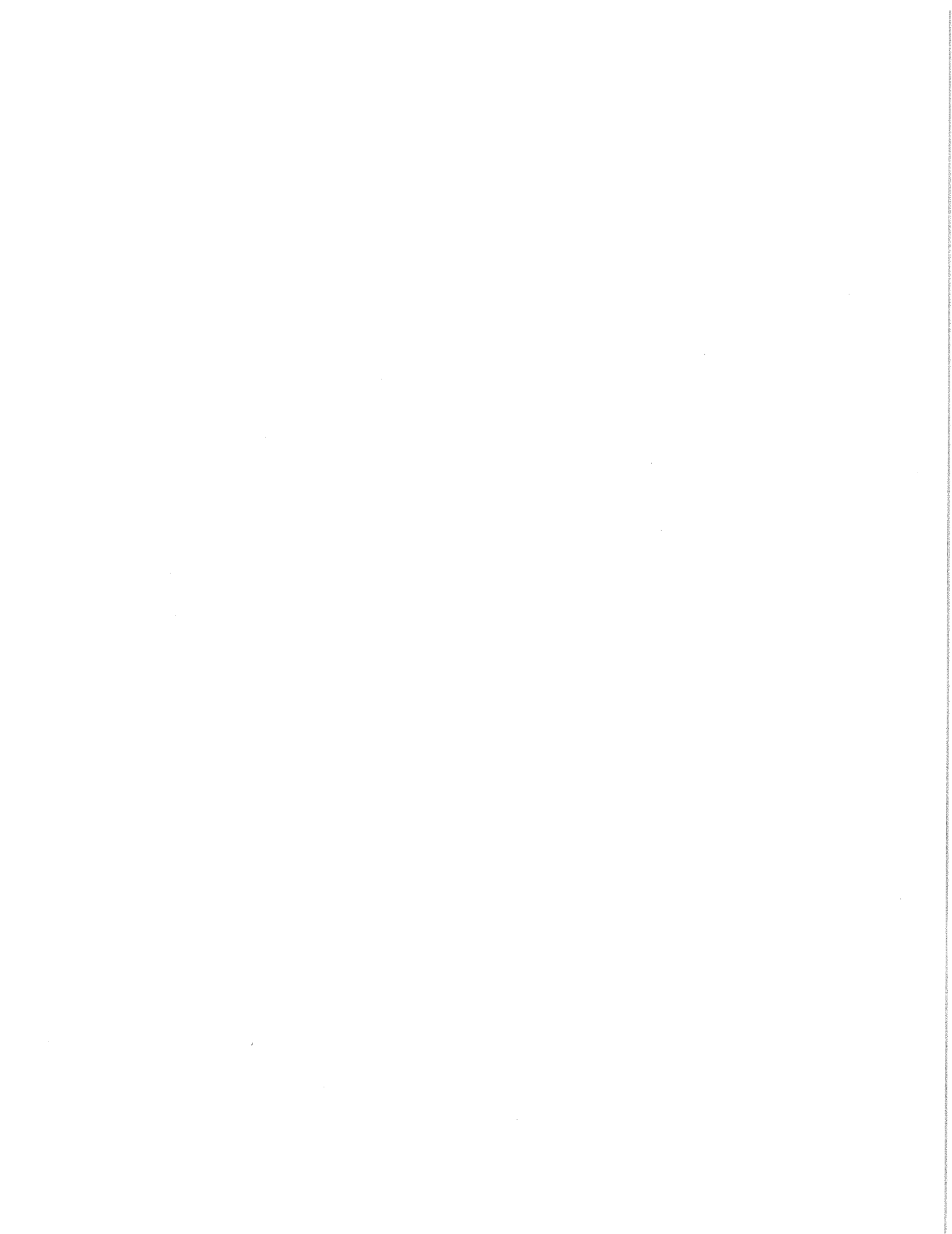

Here's a Description of Some of Them:

CCJ 1020, Introduction to Criminal Justice -

Learn how criminal justice developed, where it's going, the relationship between the police, courts and the prisons and the role the media plays in our justice system.

CCJ 2191, Human Behavior in Criminal Justice -

Learn how people become crime victims, study the police personality, learn what influences the jurors' decision and why lawyers try certain tactics, discuss causes behind prison violence.

CJC 2000, Intro to Corrections -

Learn how prisons and jails operate, the impact of inmate rights lawsuits on jail / prison operations, gain insight into rehabilitative programs, such as "boot camps" and "work release."

CJE 1300, Criminal Justice Organizations & Management -

Learn what it takes to run a police agency from budget management to effective supervision techniques to employee counseling and evaluation.

CJE 2400, Police-Community Relations -

Understand what causes tension between the police and different groups in the community, learn how police training may positively impact community relations, study successful community policing programs.

CJE 2600, Criminal Investigation-

Learn how cops investigate crimes, the strategies behind suspect and victim interrogation, whether Miranda helps or hurts in getting a confession, and ways to search crime scenes.

CJE 2640, Intro to Criminalistics -

Learn scientific aspects of investigation, how to lift fingerprints and to read blood splatters, and learn ways to preserve crime scenes / evidence. This course is taught in the BC Crime Lab.

CJE 2770, Forensic Photography -

Learn crime scene photography (film, digital and video), including identification, evaluation and court requirements. Create computer generated illustrations of crime scenes. (For A.S. Crime Scene degree only)

CJJ 2001, Juvenile Justice -

What should happen to a 14 yr. old who robs, rapes or kills? Should parents be held liable? What programs work and don't work in juvenile crime prevention and rehabilitation?

CJL 1062, Constitutional Law -

Learn the impact the Constitution has on police procedures, such as Miranda warnings, interrogations, consent searches, frisk for weapons, detentions, arrests and use of force.

CJL 1100, Criminal Law -

Learn the difference between murder and manslaughter, study crimes of violence and crimes against property, and study criminal defenses, such as insanity, self-defense and entrapment.

CJL 1130, Criminal Evidence -

Learn courtroom procedures, why evidence may be thrown out, and how the rules of evidence impact police actions, such as interrogations, evidence preservation and officer testimony.

DSC 1002, Terrorism & Domestic Security --

Topics include terrorist organizations and motivations, investigating terrorism threats, conducting vulnerability assessments of potential terrorist targets, and response to a terrorist incident and recovery afterwards.

DSC 2590, Intelligence Analysis -

Learns methods of intelligence gathering, how to evaluate the reliability of source information, analyze threats to security, discuss ethical and professional behaviors in intelligence gathering.
